JUST COMMUNITIES COMMITMENTS

Twenty-two Commitments organized into five priority areas to help communities define success and measure progress.

METRICS TO GUIDE EQUITABLE AND REGENERATIVE DEVELOPMENT

Just Communities explicitly tackles the most entrenched and complex challenges facing communities today – poverty, blight and deteriorating infrastructure, lack of economic opportunity, environmental pollution, climate disruption, and health inequities – whether it is within a historically disenfranchised neighborhood disproportionately impacted by rapid growth or disinvestment, or a brownfield site preparing to be redeveloped. To help communities get organized, we developed the following Just Communities Commitments to help guide planning and implementation. Each Commitment helps:

Leverage local data to guide decision making

The Just Communities Commitments ask every community to identify what matters most and sets clear targets to help guide investment decisions and measure progress over time. This includes establishing clear objectives and indicators to determining a starting point (baseline) and what success looks like over time (targets).

Foster Collaboration

Just Communities helps communities see the bigger picture and need for collaboration. Proposed targets must be clearly described, practical, and agreed upon by multiple partners to create a powerful strategic implementation blueprint to guide local project, program, and policy investments.

Harness local wisdom and experience

Just Communities calls for authentic and meaningful participation by the community to shape priorities. This includes partnering with the community to co-design an inclusive engagement plan early in the process, with a focus on documenting lived experiences and local knowledge.
